Mr. Noble Earnest "Doc" Young opened the first African American drugstore in Tyler in 1946. He provided job opportunities for African Americans of all ages to work in his store as clerks and delivery personnel for newspapers, magazines and printed African American publications from 1946 to 1984.

"Doc" Young furnished class rings, caps and gowns, and senior memorabilia to students of Emmett J. Scott High School whose families could not afford them. He also provided free medicine to families who could not pay, as well as interest-free loans to families who needed help. He did his best to give back to his community, help others in need, and see that African Americans in his community were given a fair and equal opportunity academically, socially and spiritually.

The "Drug Store," as it was more commonly called, offered a safe and wholesome gathering place for the community and was the center of a three-block thriving business area in North Tyler called "The Cut."

As a member of the St. Louis Baptist Church, "Doc" served on the trustee board. He was a life member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

"Doc" Young's godson, Judge Quincy Beavers, Jr., was elected the first African American Justice of the Peace in Smith County, Texas.



Emmett J. Scott High School

The original high school in Tyler for African Americans was established in 1888 in the old West End School building on South Herndon Avenue. It was a four-room structure that housed grades one through ten. The building burned in 1921, which caused school sessions to be held in churches within the city.

A new building was erected in 1923. The location was changed to North Border Avenue since neighbors proposed rebuilding the school on South Herndon. The new school building was renamed Emmett Scott Junior High and was used for both elementary and high school grades. When W. A. Peete and T. J. Austin elementary schools were built, the small building formerly used for elementary grades became the Emmett Scott homemaking department.

In 1949, what began as a four-room school with a graduating class of four students became Emmett J. Scott High School on West Lincoln Street (now M. L. King Jr. Boulevard). The school included 25 classrooms, an administrative suite, library, cafeteria, shop, auditorium, gymnasium and band hall.

Emmett J. Scott High School closed in June 1970, through an integration order affecting all Texas public schools.




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

Mr. Noble Earnest "Doc" Young, attended public school at St. Louis and East Texas Academy he graduated at the age of fifteen from High School. He graduated from Meharry Medical College in Nashville, Tennessee, at the early age of Nineteen and was the youngest of his fellow classmates to graduate with a degree in pharmacy. He later attended Bishop College in Marshall, Texas, where he received a B. S. Degree in chemistry and biology, and a supervisory certification of Education. Further pursuit of educational excellence was obtained at the University of Nebraska, in Lincoln, Nebraska.

Work Experience:

He taught at Stanton High School in Smith County, Texas, where he set up the school's consolidated curriculum and served as the school's first principal. He later moved to California where he worked as a chemist. He was employed as a pharmacist in Arkansas, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, and Texas. He opened up the first African American drugstore in Tyler in 1946 and remained there until 1984, when he retired.

Affiliations:

As a member of the St. Louis Baptist Church, he served on the trustee board. He was a life member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

In 1986, the name of the St. Louis Park was changed to the Noble E. Young Park in honor of his many years of community service.

Humanitarian Attributes:

"Doc" Young provided job opportunities for African Americans of all ages to work in his store as clerks and delivery personnel of Ebony/Jet magazines and other African American printed newspapers/publications during the years of 1946-1984.

"Doc" Young furnished cap/gowns and class rings to graduating seniors from Emmett Scott High School, offering payment plans to help African American families afford senior memorabilia for their children. If families could not afford to pay for their children senior memorabilia, "Doc Young" would also donate his own money to pay for senior memorabilia. "Doc" Young also would provide free medicine to those who could not afford to pay and he would offer loans without interest to African Americans in his community who were in need to help their families.

One of "Doc" Young's most notable attributes was giving back to his community and helping others in need.

Where ever there was a need in the community, "Doc" Young would do his best to fill in the void by offering up his time, money, and effort to see that many African Americans in his community were given a fair an equal shot for achievement, academically, socially, and spiritually.

The interior contained magazine racks with all African American publications from across the country and booths/counter stools where one could sit and enjoy a banana split or an ice cream soda. The "Drug Store" was the center of a three block thriving African American business area in North Tyler affectionately called "The Cut". There were grocery stores, restaurants, service stations, cleaners, movie theaters, beauty and barber shops, a beauty school, a funeral home, boarding houses, a hotel, auto mechanics, a skating rink, YMCA, doctors, dentists and eventually a police sub-station. This business community supported and met the needs of the surrounding community which contained homes, public schools, and a historically African American College (Texas College).



City of Tyler Historical Subject Marker Application Form



This form constitutes a public request to the City of Tyler to consider approval of an Official City of Tyler Historical Subject Marker. The City of Tyler Historical Preservation Board will review the request and make the final determination of eligibility and therefore may approve the Subject Marker designation. Filing of the application is for the purpose of providing basic information to be used in the evaluation process. This form is to be used for subject marker requests only. Please see separate forms for either City of Tyler Landmark or Half-Mile of History Programs.

Subject Marker Definition

Subject markers are educational in nature and reveal aspects of local history important to a community or region. These markers honor topics such as church congregations, schools, communities, businesses, events and individuals. Subject markers are placed at sites that have historical associations with the topics, but no legal restriction is placed on the use of the property or site, although the Historical Preservation Board must be notified if the marker is ever to be relocated. **The Historical Preservation Board will only consider topics which do not have an existing State or National Subject Marker.**

Application Requirements

Any individual or group may apply to the City of Tyler to request a City of Tyler Historical Subject Marker for what it deems a worthy topic. Only complete marker applications that contain all the required elements can be accepted or processed by the Historical Preservation Board.

The required elements are:

- Application Form
- Narrative History
- Supporting documentation, including photographs

Photographs are required. Do not send original photos. All submitted materials will become property of the City of Tyler and its Historical Preservation Board.

- Narrative histories must include separate sections on:
 - a. **Background** which represents a broader set of facts that explain why the event, site or structure should be considered historic and the enduring contributions to the area.
 - b. **Overview** of the key facts in chronological order with clearly documented historic connections to the area.

Historical Subject Marker

Criteria

1. **Age:** Most topics marked with subject markers must date back at least 50 years, although historic events may be marked after 30 years, and historic individuals may be marked, or may be mentioned in a historical marker text, after they have been deceased 10 years. The Historical Preservation Board may waive age requirements for topics of overwhelming local, state or national importance, although exceptions are rarely granted and the burden of proof for all claims and documentation is the responsibility of the narrative author.

Subject age or event date:

1946-1984

2. **Historical significance:** A topic is considered to have historical significance if it had influence, effect or impact on the course of history or cultural development; age alone does not determine significance. It is expected that most historical markers will deal with local history and a local level of significance; however state and national importance can be considered.

*For markers without posts, the applicant must receive special approval from the Historic Preservation Board. Such approval shall be based upon the following:

- Submittal of a detailed plan for where the marker will be mounted, including the surface to which it will be placed (masonry, metal, wood); and
- A statement of why a marker with a post is not feasible or preferred.
